The College of Humanities under the direction of Dr. Stephen Gardner, dean of the college, houses the Department of English, the Department of Fine Arts and the Department of Communications.

The college offers eight degree and minor programs. Included in this selection: Bachelor of Arts in English and minors in English, journalism and theatre/speech communication. Also, students may choose the Bachelor of Science or Arts in Interdisciplinary Studies.

According to Gardner, art studio and theatre are two concentrations that may be offered in the future. There would be a need for more fac-

ulty members, but the students are expressing an interest in the art related areas.

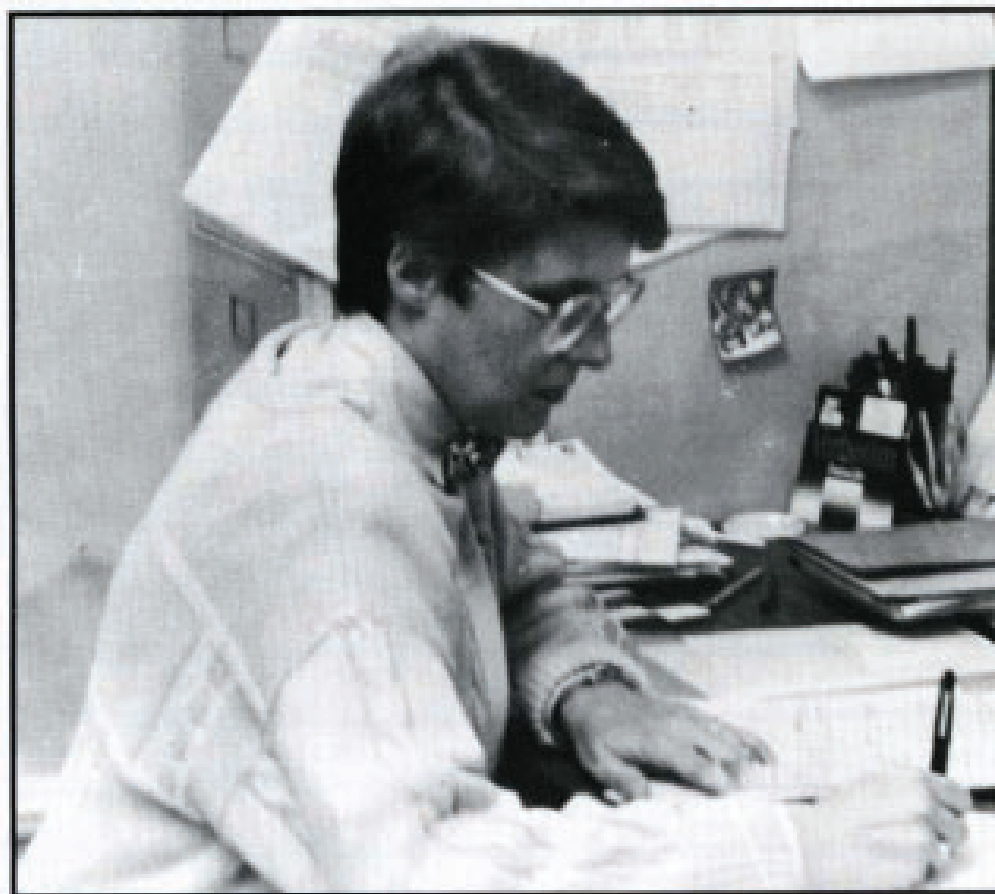
Gardner said that enrollment has increased in courses that students are not required to take. Also, failure in English 101 classes has dropped.

"We study the whys and wherefores of the human beast," Gardner said.

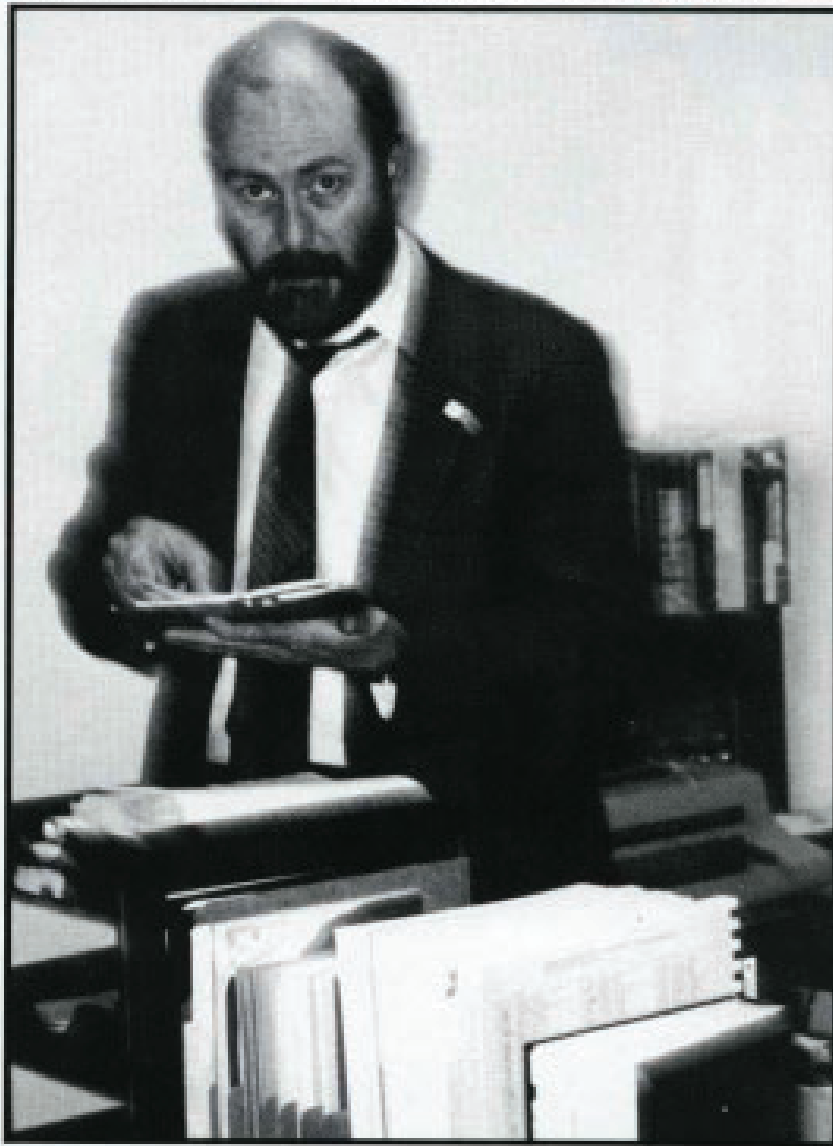
He said the faculty are extremely dedicated, and they care about what they do and the people they teach.

"They are at the cutting edge of their professions," Gardner said.



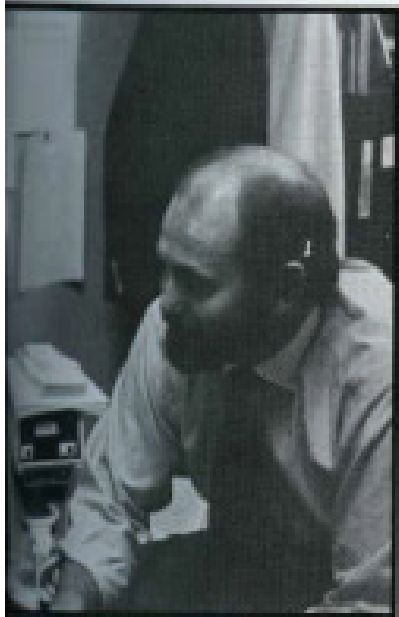

## *Minor opportunities*

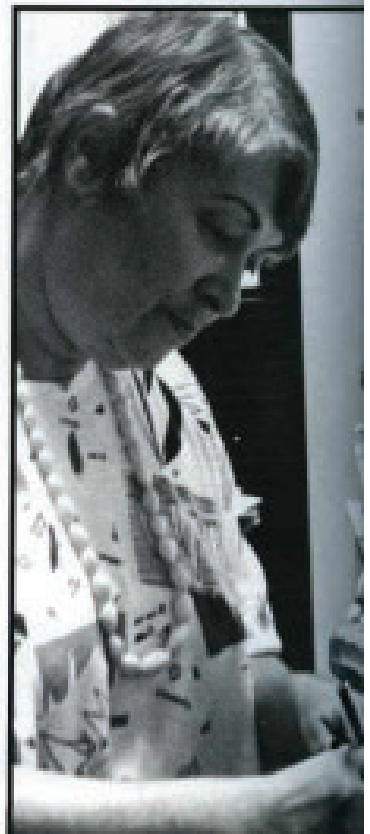
The Department of Communications may not offer any majors, but it does offer several minor opportunities.

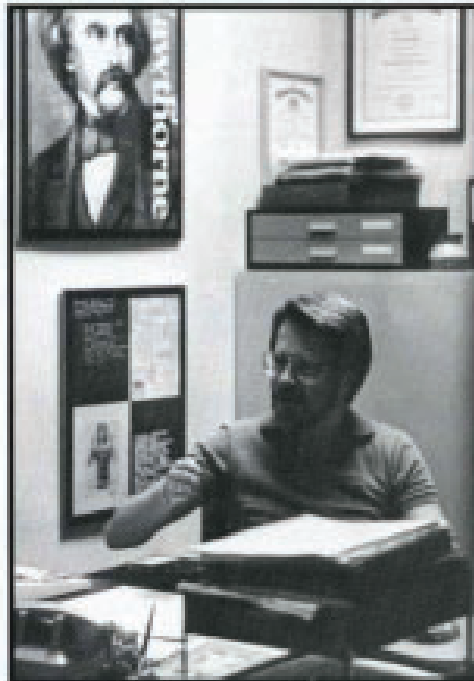
## *Active in English*

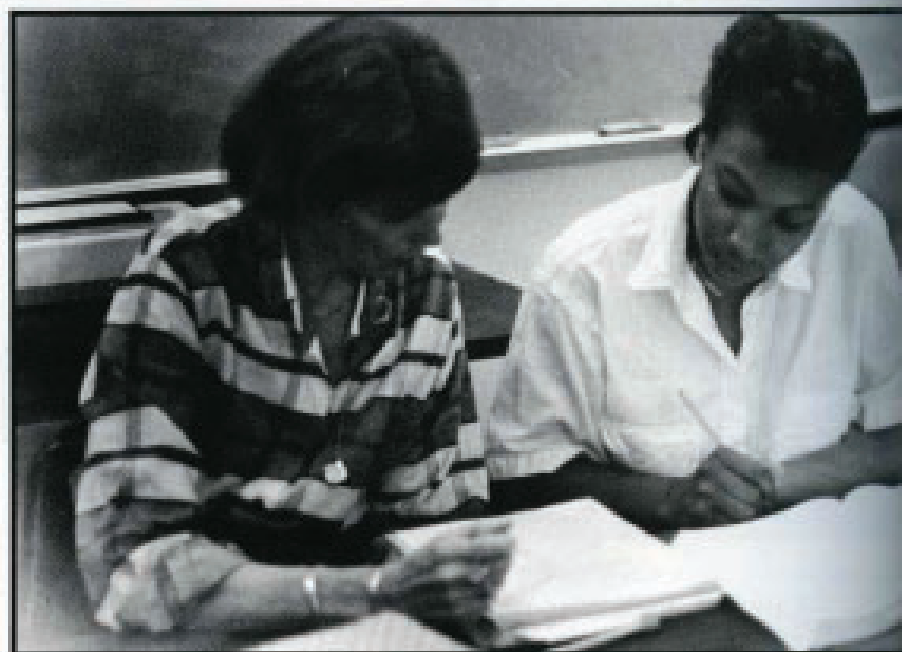
Beginning this year, chemistry has been added to the curriculum. A student may now complete a Bachelor of Science in Chemistry at this campus, without transferring.

The expansion of the college is due in part to the new science building expected to be completed by January 1989.

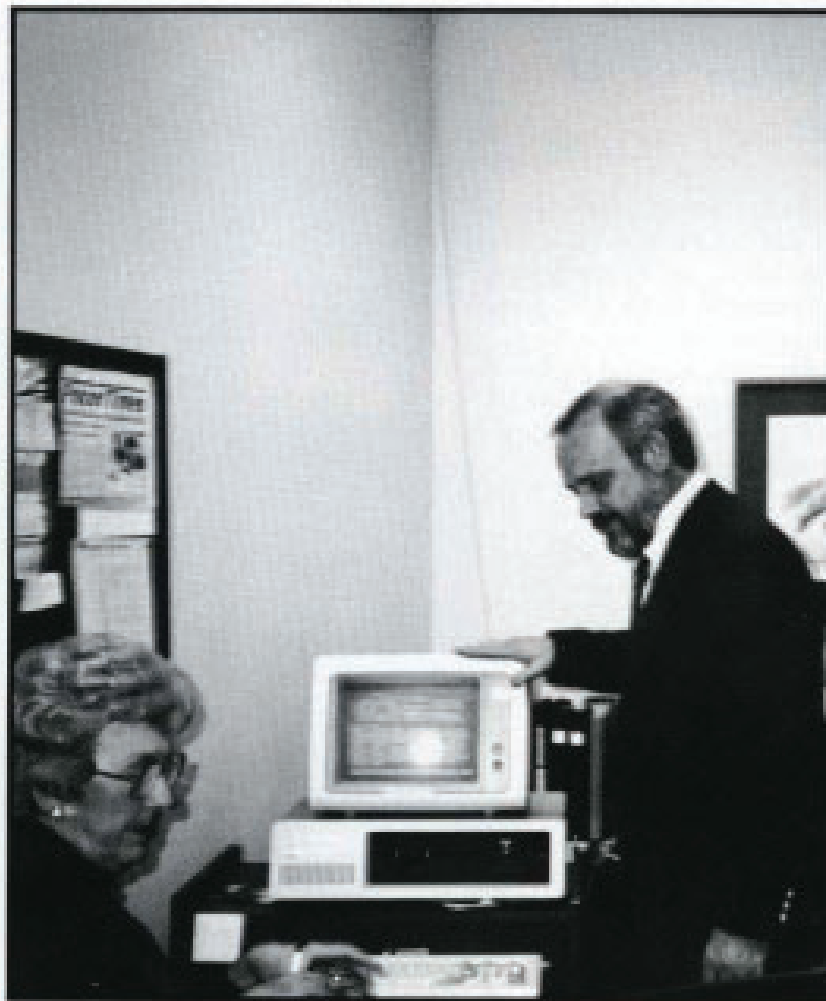
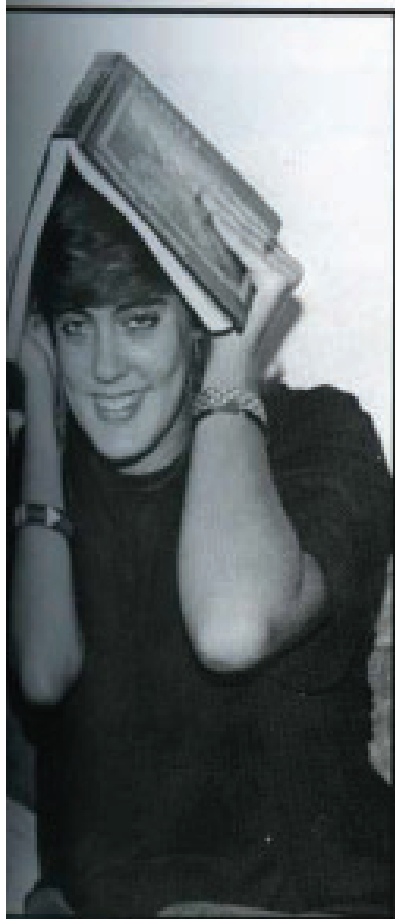

The School of Nursing, under the direction of Dr. Trudy Groves, offers an Associate of Science in Nursing under a two track program.

Track I admission requires that a student have a combined SAT score of 900 or better. Track II nursing students are those whose SAT scores

were between 700 and 900. These students must stay in Track II until they have completed 15 semester hours with at least a 3.0 GPA. Once these requirements have been met, the student may apply for admission into the Track I program.

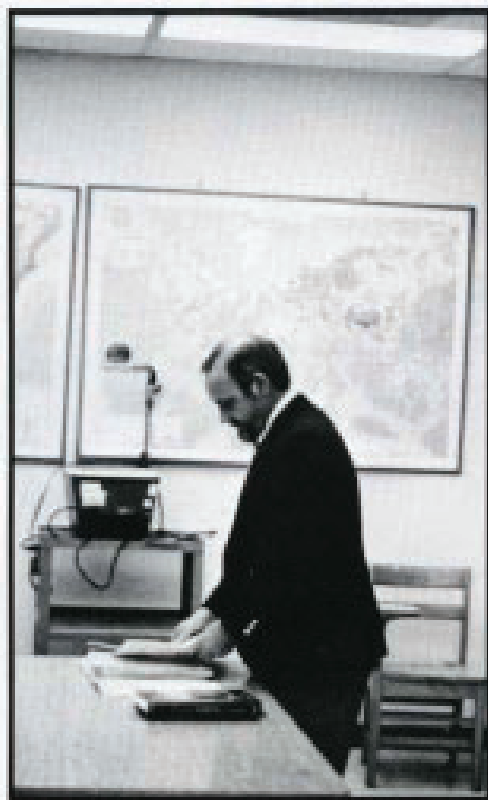

Students may also complete two years of the curriculum for a major in Geology here. Those interested in Physics/Astronomy may complete some of their course work here.

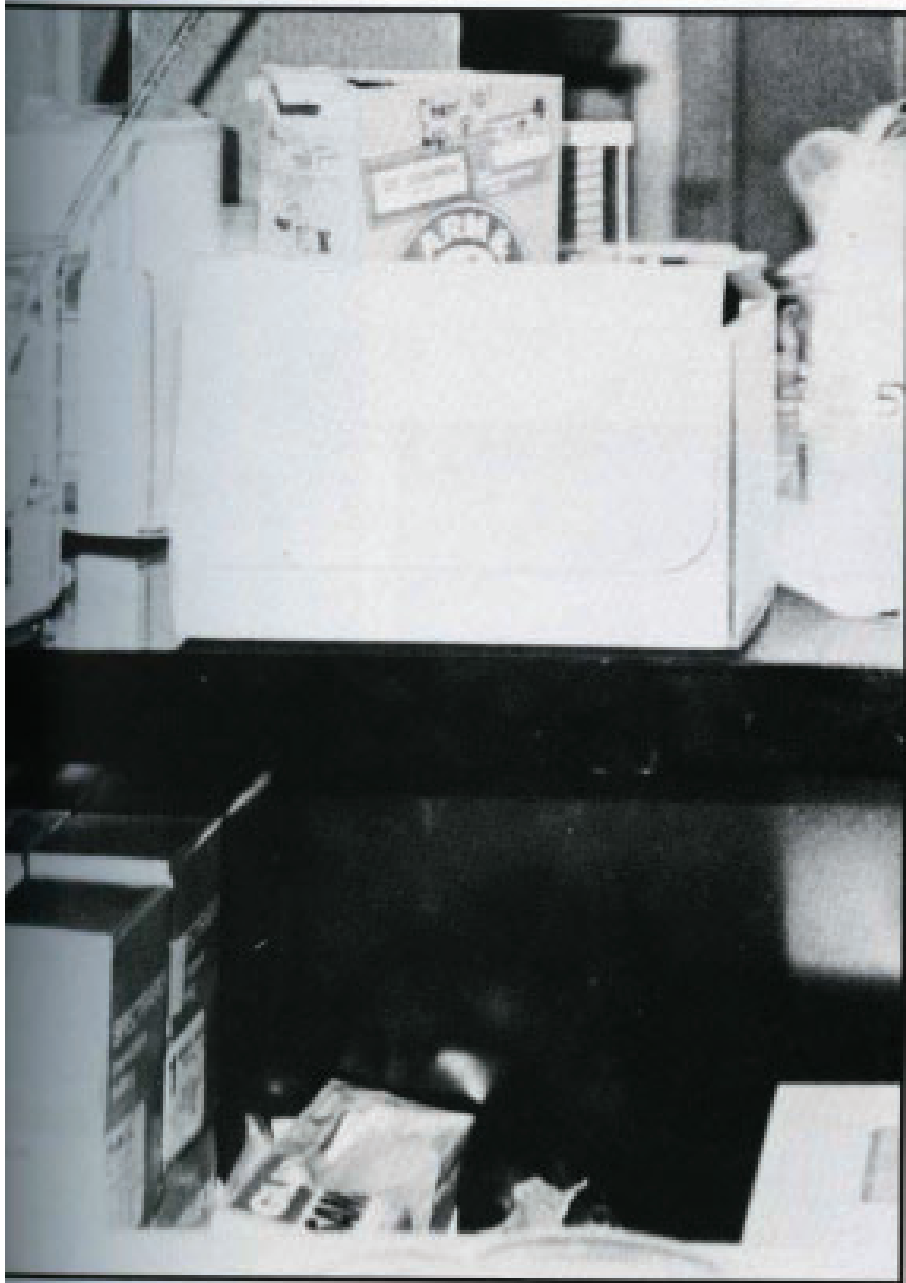
