The club meets regularly once a month, most often the last week of the month.

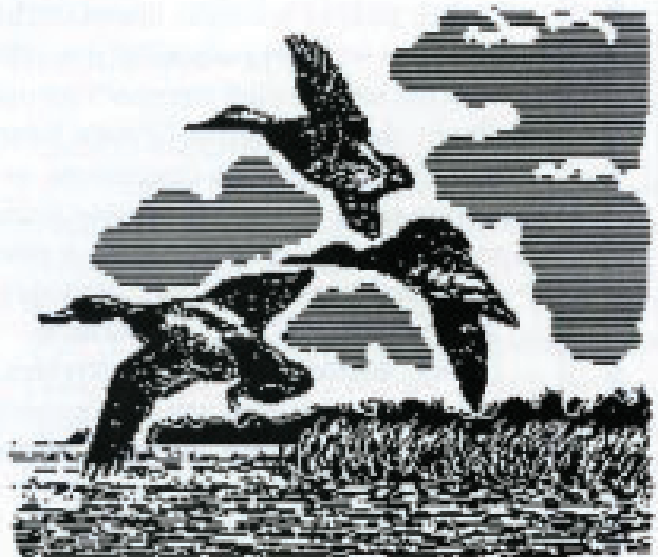

One of the main functions of the science is to further the participation and knowledge of its members, as well as students from local area high and middle schools in their field of scientific interest. The USC-A science club plans to assist in future activities at the Ruth Patrick Science Education Center. In addition to these activities, the science club has also provided tutoring services in chemistry and other related sciences.

In addition to increasing the awareness of science and technology, the

Science Club has also participated in many fundraising activities benefiting local charities. During the Thanksgiving Holidays, the Science Club participated in a canned food drive to help the needy over the holidays. The Science Club has also donated all of its proceeds to the Helping Hands foster home for abused and neglected children of Aiken County.

The Science Club has shown its support for the protection of the environment by purchasing endangered plants to be planted at the Ruth Patrick Science Education Center. In addition, the club supports the USC-A aluminum can recycling program.

Finally, the club plans to provide local elementary science teachers with additional funds or resources needed to do practical scientific demonstrations and experiments.

USCA's Student Government Association is made up of three executives and eighteen senators. The SGA played an active role in the number of events this year including open forums for student grievances, Homecoming and Into the Streets.

The Executive members for the 1991-92 school year are President Kelvin Coleman, Vice President Jignesh Paynda, and Secretary Treasurer Christopher Powers. This committee traveled to St. Louis to represent USC

Aiken in a leadership conference.

Other officers of SGA are Brian Wilson (President Pro Tempore), Scott Brown (Judicial Committee Chair), Rich Liacona (Public Relations Chair), Chris Rogers (Finance Chair), Sean Wolf (Elections Chair), and Linda Feldman (SCR Chair). Other senators include Tamala Conner, Jamie Gunter, Patrick Gearman, Tim Monaco, Josh Tribiani, Joe Tsai, Heather Wagner, and Heath Woodward.



The USCA Pacesetters are student orientation leaders and interns. When the program began in 1985, all the Pacesetters served both as student orientation leaders and interns. Their primary purpose is to assist USCA students in making a smooth transition to higher education from high school, home, another college, or the workplace. In these early years following orientation, Pacesetters were assigned to work in an administrative unit or with a faculty member as a student intern.

Pacesetters were initially nominated by a faculty or staff member and had to satisfy a minimum GPA requirement of 2.75. Pacesetters attended a week long training period preceding new student orientation in the fall.

The Pacesetters served primarily as the entering students' contact and helped them in understanding the process of beginning college. They assisted them in advisement and registration, in scheduling classes, and in learning about student clubs and organizations.

As the years passed, the Pacesetter program moved to a program that promoted student development and leader-

ship, as well as assisting new students and faculty and staff.

In 1989 USCA moved to major reorganization of its new student orientation program. At that time, the number of Pacesetters increased to 35, and about 12 of the participants were given the opportunity to continue throughout the year as a student intern if they wished to do so. During Freshman Success Week '90, the USCA Pacesetters each lead a group of new students through a number of games, contests, activities, and workshops. For the first time, the Pacesetters became the student orientation leaders that had been envisioned in 1985. In addition, the Pacesetters were the primary individuals in planning and assisting in making of Freshman Success Week '90 the outstanding program that it was.

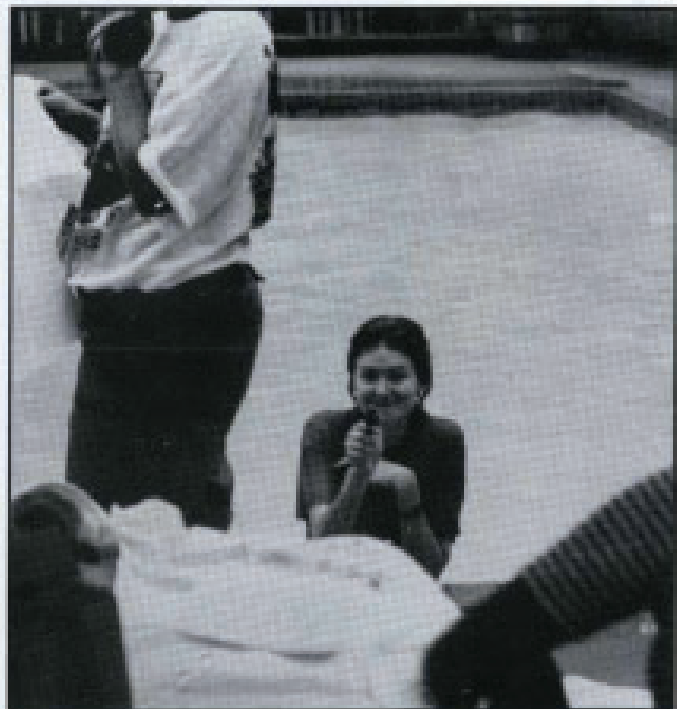

The Pacesetter Team Leaders were responsible for planning orientation, and the Pacesetters, as a group, made sure everything ran smoothly.

1904, Alpha Kappa Psi is one of the largest, growing college fraternities. The Kappa Omega Chapter currently boasts twenty-four members.

GAMMA BETA PHI is an honor and service society. It is a non-profit, co-educational organization.

The motto of GAMMA BETA PHI is "Progress per Eruditionem," its watchwords are "scholarship," "service," and "character," and its colors are gold and ebony. Gamma is the greek word for education. Beta is the initial letter for the word meaning life. Phi is the initial letter of the greek word friendship.

GAMMA BETA PHI was instated on March 22, 1964 by a group of college educators. It was chartered as an eleemosynary educational organization on April 27, 1964. Finally, it was granted tax-exempt status by the US Treasury Department on May 5, 1966. Dr. John Harris, founder of the BETA club, served as GAMMA BETA PHI's Executive Secretary from 1964 to 1974. Dr. Aaron Todd, professor of chemistry at Middle Tennessee University, led the organization from 1974 to 1984. The current national leaders are Margret McCauley, Executive Director and the Executive Secretary-Treasurer Mary Alice Parrish. The objectives of Gamma Beta Phi Society as stated in its Constitution are to recognise and encourage excellance in education, to promote the developement of leadership ability and character in its members , and to foster, disseminate, and improve education through appropriate service projects. Students invited into Gamma Beta Phi Society must be enrolled in a program leading to an associate, bachelor, or graduate degree, must have completed at least 12 credit hours of
