N. B.—This mark (\*) affixed to some Fast days, denote that such Fasts falling on the Sabbath, are postponed to Sunday, excepting the Fast of Esther, which is always observed the Thursday before.

A common or ordinary Lunar Year consists of twelve lunations, (or months) containing 354 days, and is eleven days shorter [called Epact] than the Solar Year, which has 365 days. An ordinary Leap Year, consisting of thirteen lunations, contains 384 days. To adjust the inequality between Lunar and Solar calculations, one day is sometimes added to, or diminished from, those ordinary years, by which, three variations arise in the common as well as in Leap Years—the former containing either 353, 354, or 355, and the latter 383, 384, or 385, distinguished as deficient, ordinary, or complete years.

The tides are so greatly affected by local circumstances, that local observations are necessary to be made at every port, to ascertain the interval between the Moon's southing and the high water at the respective port. This interval varies in length more than an hour, being longer and shorter at different times in the lunation, owing to the position of the tide which the Sun's influence produces. This circumstance has no doubt tended to increase the number and magnitude of the discrepancies in the general tide tables in the United States.

The interval which we want to obtain, and which in Europe is called the Establishment of the Port, is the time which elapses between the southing of the Moon and the High Water, at a time when the Sun and Moon are both south at the same time. Now as the Establishment of the Port, if it were known, would enable us to find the time of high water at any time; so from a good observation of the time of high water at any time, we can determine the Establishment of the Port.

The Establishments of the Ports are in Europe well ascertained and registered, to the number of 195, which I have just now counted. At London Bridge it is 2h 7m, at Liverpool Dock it is 1h 22m, at Calais in France, it is 1h 48m, at Dublin Bar, it is 1h 12m, and at Cork Harbour, it is 4h 30m. But in this country this business is very much in confusion. I wish the Government would take it in hand.

I suppose that for some of our principal Ports we may have arrived at a tolerable approximation in this respect. For Boston 1h 30m has long been used as the Establishment of the Port, for New-York 8h 54m, for Charleston, 7h 30m. &c: but this is not official.

### State Military Schools.

By an Act passed 20th Dec 1842, the Arsenal at Columbia, and the Citadel and Magazine in and near Charleston were converted into Military Schools, the Students and Members of which are employed in performing such services as may be assigned them; passing through a prescribed course of studies, and constituting a military corps, subject to military discipline, under the command of a Superintendent.

The Governor of the State and a Board of five persons, (under his appointment,) together with the Adjutant and Inspector-General, constitute a Board of visitors for the establishment of such regulations as may be deemed necessary and proper for the organization and good government of said Schools.

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## NEW GARDENER'S CALENDAR.

**JANUARY.**—Sow peas, spinach, lettuce, cabbages, radishes, parsley, beets, carrots, salsafy, parsnips, turnips, asparagus. Plant horse radish, Irish potatoes. Transplant cabbages and lettuces.

*Remarks.*—The best variety of peas for this month, are the early frame and Bishops, for an early crop, and dwarf marrowfat and dwarf green imperial for a succession. Only a few of beets, carrots, parsnips, salsafy, and turnips should be sown this month, as they are all very tender whilst young, and consequently easily killed. Should there be any severe weather, they should be protected by some light covering. The lettuces, cabbages and radishes should also be protected, the last may be sown between rows of carrots or among spinach. Celery should be earthed up during dry weather as often as required, which will be at least once a fortnight. Endive should be tied up for bleaching. It is late to dress artichokes and asparagus beds, but if not done before, they had better be now attended to. The Irish potatoes planted in the commencement of this month, may have their tops killed by frosts in February, but they will not be injured by it; towards the last of the month they may be planted for a general crop.

**FEBRUARY.**—Sow peas, spinach, lettuce, cabbage, radish, corn, beets, carrots, salsafy, parsnips, turnips, thyme, sage and other herbs. Plant Irish potatoes. Transplant cabbages and lettuces.

*Remarks.*—The same varieties of peas may be sown in this month, as were directed for the last. The principal crop of beets and carrots should now be sown. The common varieties of spinach should be sown in small quantities once in ten days, as it soon runs to seed.

**MARCH.**—Sow carrots, beets, Swiss chard, parsnips, salsafy, cabbages, spinach, turnips, leeks, tomatoes, peppers, radishes, lettuce and Guinea squash. Plant cucumbers, okra, squashes, melons, snap-beans, cushaws, seaweed beans, New-Zealand spinach. Transplant tomatoes, peppers, Guinea squash, cabbages and lettuce.

*Remarks.*—All of the above vegetables should be got in at as early a period as possible. Carrots should now be sown for a full crop, and sufficient to last until the autumn, as it will be difficult to get them up during the summer, but if sown with this view English seeds must be procured. The lettuce should be sown where they are to remain, as they are then less liable to run to seed. The New-Zealand spinach should be sown in hills 3 feet apart each way. Radishes should be sown once every three weeks, in order that there may be a regular succession. All Irish potatoes ought to be planted this month as they do not answer well after. Should the season be mild, most of the vegetables mentioned in March, may be sown towards the last of the month.

**APRIL.**—Sow carrots, beets, salsafy, turnips, cabbages, cauliflowers, brocoli, tomatoes, peppers, radishes, lettuce, celery, leeks. Plant okra, snap-beans, squashes, seaweed beans, cucumbers, cushaws, melons. Transplant cabbages, tomatoes, peppers, Guinea squashes.—Prick out celery.

*Remarks.*—The sowing of the main crop of carrots or summer and autumn, ought not to be delayed longer than this month, as they will be difficult to get up during the succeeding months, and will be easily killed when up. The seed should be from Europe or they will run to seed in the fall. Cucumbers, squashes and melons do not succeed well if delayed until this month, but where they have been neglected, or destroyed by accident, a few may be now sown. The same remark applies to beets, salsafy, parsnips and turnips. Lettuces are very uncertain, and the only chance of getting them to cabbage is to

sow them where they are to remain. The only variety of cabbage which ought to be set out in this and the succeeding months, is the green glazed, which alone can resist the attacks of the worms.

**MAY.**—Sow cabbages, savoys, carrots, beets, turnips, cauliflowers, brocoli, celery, radishes. Plant snap beans. Transplant cabbages. Prick out celery.

*Remarks.*—There is not much probability of either beets, parsnips, carrots, or turnips, succeeding at this season, especially the last, yet if wanted a few may be ventured—under very favourable circumstances they may succeed. If carrots be sown, the ground should be shaded and kept moist, and this protection continued to the young plants and sometime after they are up, or they will be killed by the hot sun.

**JUNE.**—Sow cauliflowers, brocoli, cabbages, carrots, tomatoes. Plant snap beans, okra. Transplant celery, cabbages, leeks. Prick out cauliflowers, brocoli and celery.

*Remarks.*—This month is generally very dry and hot, and all of the crops recommended to be sown now, must be protected from the sun, most of them should have been sown in April and it is only in case of failure, or omission that they should now be sown; the month may be considered bad for the sowing of seeds generally.

**JULY.**—Sow early Dutch turnips, ruta бага, carrots, parsnips, cabbages, cauliflowers, brocoli, endive, radishes, spinach. Plant snap beans, Irish potatoes, melons. Transplant cabbages, celery, cauliflowers, brocoli, tomatoes and leeks.

*Remarks.*—A few only of carrots, parsnips, spinach or radishes, should be sown, as it is not very probable that they will succeed, unless well protected from the sun for some length of time, whilst young. The early Dutch turnips, should also be sown, towards the middle and last of the month, in small quantities, as they are very likely to rot when about the size of a dollar. The Irish potatoes will be fit for use in October, and the tomatoes will furnish a supply when the spring sown crop has ceased to bear, and then continue until killed by a frost.

**AUGUST.**—Sow peas, early Dutch and other varieties of turnips, ruta бага, onions, cabbages, cauliflowers, brocoli, black Spanish radishes, radishes, carrots, beets, parsnips, salsafy, lettuce, and endive. Plant snap beans. Transplant cabbages, cauliflowers, brocoli, celery, ruta бага and endive.

*Remarks.*—Not much can be expected from peas sown in this month, as they will be very much crippled by the high winds and rain which we usually have, but where they are wanted a few may be ventured. The beets and spinach are liable to the attacks of the worms which destroy their leaves, should they escape these, they will be very fine.

**SEPTEMBER.**—Sow early Dutch and other varieties of turnips, ruta бага, beets, Swiss chard, mangle wurtzel, carrots, parsnips, salsafy, lettuce, spinach, cabbages, (English seed) onions, radishes, endive. Plant snap beans. Transplant ruta бага, cabbages, cauliflowers, brocoli, celery, lettuce, leeks, endive.

*Remarks.*—In this month, the principal crops of turnips, beets, carrots, parsnips, &c. should be sown, as they will acquire sufficient strength to withstand the cold weather before the winter sets in. When thinning out the ruta бага, the plants should be reserved and transplanted out either into those spaces where they have failed, or into a piece prepared expressly for them. If the cabbage seeds are not English, they will run to seed in the spring without heading.

**OCTOBER.**—Sow cabbages, lettuce, carrots, beets, turnips, radishes, spinach, salsafy, parsnips, ruta бага. Transplant cabbages, cauliflowers, brocoli, onions, lettuce, leeks and endive.

*Remarks.*—If any of the crops recommended above have not been

sown, they should not be neglected longer, most of them may be yet sown with considerable advantage. The artichokes should in this month be attended to, the suckers removed and manure given. Strawberries should be set out in this month, they will bear in the ensuing Spring.

**NOVEMBER.**—Sow peas, cabbages, radishes, carrots, spinach, turnips, parsnips, lettuce, beets, salsafy. Plant mazagon and wind-sor beans. Transplant cabbages, lettuce, onions and leeks.

*Remarks*—The first crops of peas may be sown about the commencement of this month, and a general crop towards the last, though it is best to defer this until the next month. The dwarf marrowfat and dwarf green imperial are the best varieties for the sowing. The asparagus beds should now be dressed and good supply manure given.

**DECEMBER.**—Sow peas, spinach, radishes, carrots, salsafy, lettuce, cabbages, beets, parsnips. Plant Irish potatoes, mazagon and windsor beans. Transplant cabbages, lettuce and onions.

*Remarks*—Any of the varieties of peas may be sown in this month. The Irish potatoes will come up so early as to have their tops destroyed by frosts, but they will not be injured materially, if at all, by this. All seeds sown during this month, except spinach, peas and beans, must be protected during the cold weather.

Pilots must be furnished with a license.—Not to absent themselves, nor hire out their Boats, under a penalty of \$100, with costs and the loss of License.—Cruising or standing out to sea, must offer his services first to the vessel nearest the Bar, except when he sees a more distant vessel in distress: under a penalty of \$50 with costs.—Must bring Vessels to Quarantine Ground, and remain on board, until the Port Physician shall permit him to depart, under the penalty of \$50, with costs.—Brigs in a vessel shall have the exclusive right to take her out again.—Shall receive additional fees for boarding vessels to the leeward of the bar, or for taking charge of any vessel at the distance of ten leagues from the bar: shall be entitled to receive \$4 for every day of his being on board, previous to her coming into port, over and above the fees established.—If directed by the master of an inward vessel to anchor in the roads, and afterwards to bring her up to the city, shall be entitled to \$4 for such extra service.—Bringing in a vessel, may demand their fees before she departs, and refuse to carry her out, if such charges are not duly paid; no other pilot shall have a right to carry her out, on pain of being liable to such pilot for the fees of bringing her in and taking her out, as well as for any other charges that may be due to such pilot on account of such vessel, and whenever a pilot entitled to carry out a vessel, is apprehensive that his fees of pilotage may not be paid by her master, or owner, or consignee, after he brings her over the bar, he shall have a right to demand his fees in advance, or sufficient security for payment thereof; and on failure thereof, to refuse to carry her out, in that case also, no other pilot shall have a right to carry out such vessel, on pain of being liable to the former pilot for the fees of her pilotage.

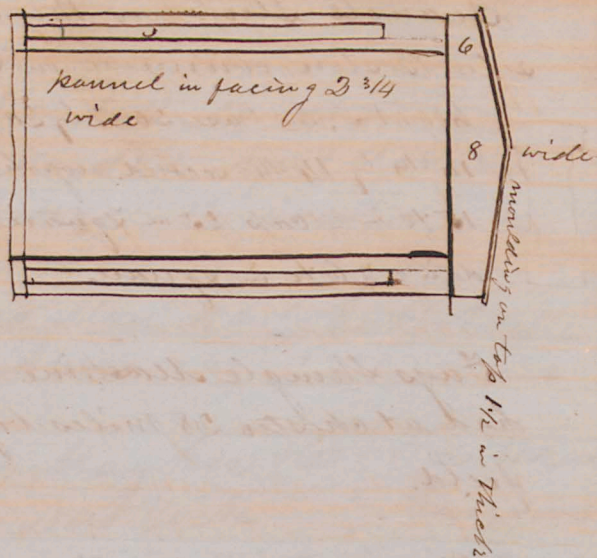

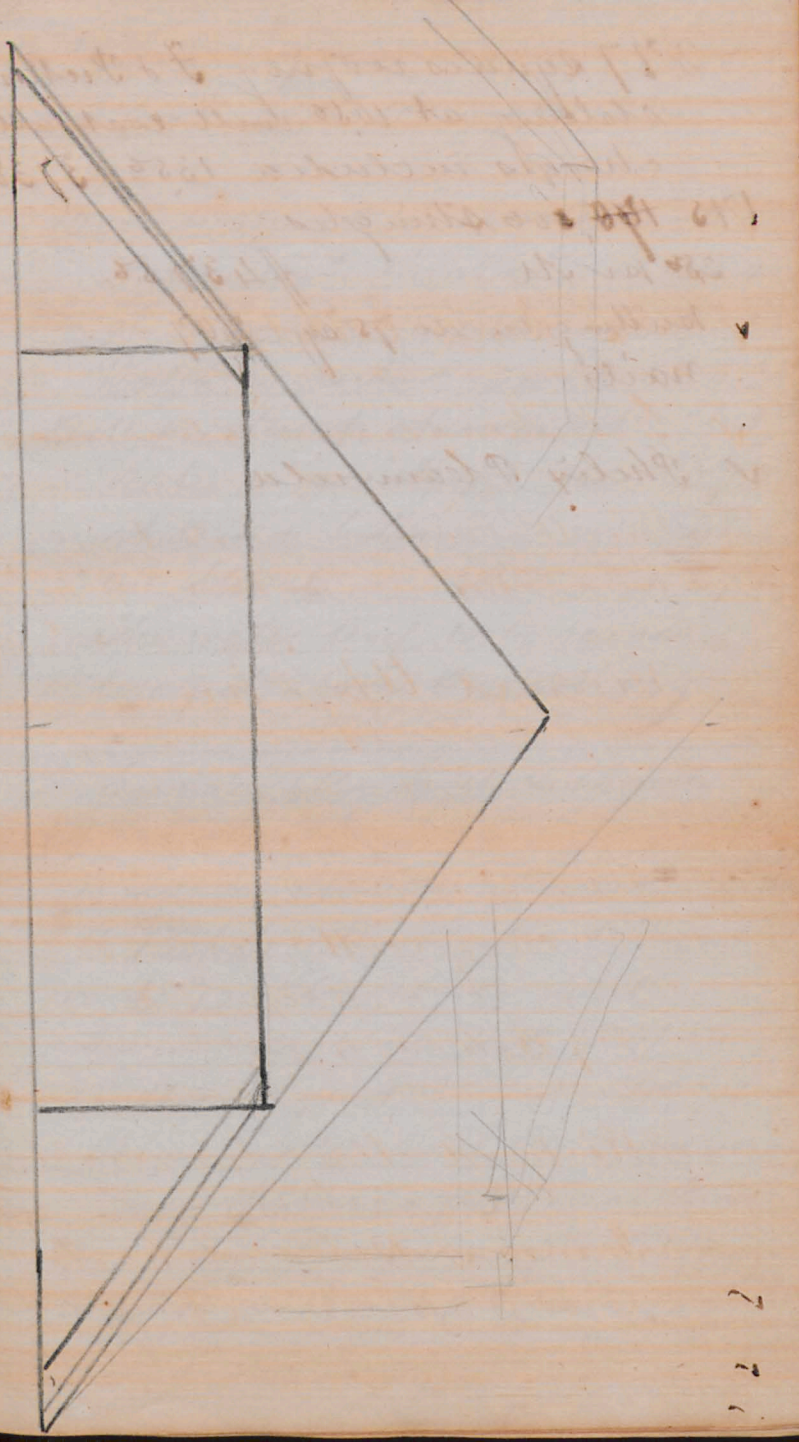

It has been found by experiments  
made in numerous rivers, canals

form, that the fall per mile is equal  
to the velocity per second multiplied

Thus we see, that if; we have  
given the quantity of water and the  
area of the water way in width &  
depth, that the velocity with which  
the water must move and the de-  
clivity necessary in order to produce  
such velocity, as will discharge  
the given quantity, are determined  
by simple arithmetical operations.

Suppose 54 cubic feet of water per  
second flows in a channel 6 feet wide  
by 3 feet deep. The quantity 54 divided  
by the area 18 gives 3 ft per second  
as the velocity, and the area 18 divid-  
ed by the sum of sides and bottom  
12 gives  $1\frac{1}{2}$  as the mean radius.

Now the velocity multiplied by  
itself is 9 and this divided by twice  
 $1\frac{1}{2}$  or 3, feet fall per mile as the  
declivity.
