# Non-Trads

**H**ooray for the non-traditional students!!! Sometimes it can take years of self-talking to mail that college application. The big step has been taken and the application has been processed and you are officially enrolled in college. Now come the butterflies, the questions, "what am I doing here?" plague the mind and it will take time for adjustment. A supportive spouse, or an unsupportive spouse can make the difference. Children, almost regardless of age, also can help as a family adjusts to new schedules and demands. Time management skills will play an important role.

In talking with other non-tradition students, which make up over 40% of USCA's student body, most describe their first semester as scary. "I was scared to death. I didn't know anyone," was a typical answer when non-trads were asked about that

first semester. It is scary, returning to school after an absence of, perhaps several years. New friends can be met in classes, in campus clubs and organizations, or even while standing in line to buy textbooks. These friends can become even more valuable when planning next semester's class schedule. They may have had professors from whom you need to take classes in the future. The learning process, however, becomes easier with each passing class.

**T**he fear of failing is mentioned frequently by "Non-Trads" and some do not even tell family or friends they have returned to school until they have proven to themselves that they really can do it. Many set high goals for themselves, believing that if they do not make all A's, they have failed. The counseling office is a good place for tips on improving study habits, time





management skills or to discuss any worry or concern.

As you meet other non-trads, you will hear stories of their first semester. You might hear about the student who didn't eat lunch all semester because he/she didn't know what or where, the Feedbag was, or the one who never went anywhere except the classroom building because that's where her classes were and she didn't like going into strange places alone. There is also the student who was mistaken

for the professor while the professor stood there being mistaken for a student. You will discover how well mannered some of the traditional students are as they continually address you as "Ma'am" or "Sir". But this can easily be relaxed once the semester gets under way, and everyone is working equally hard to attain his or her goals. We are all students and that's where the age barrier is broken.

**N**on-trads come from all walks of life, and vary in age from the 20's to the 70's (and even a few beyond). They are: wives, husbands, mothers, fathers, divorced, employed, unemployed, full-time, part-time, auditing for personal interest, or striving for academic achievement

and professional advancement. Whatever the reason or situation, once they get their feet wet, everyone fits in easily. Education is truly a life long endeavor.

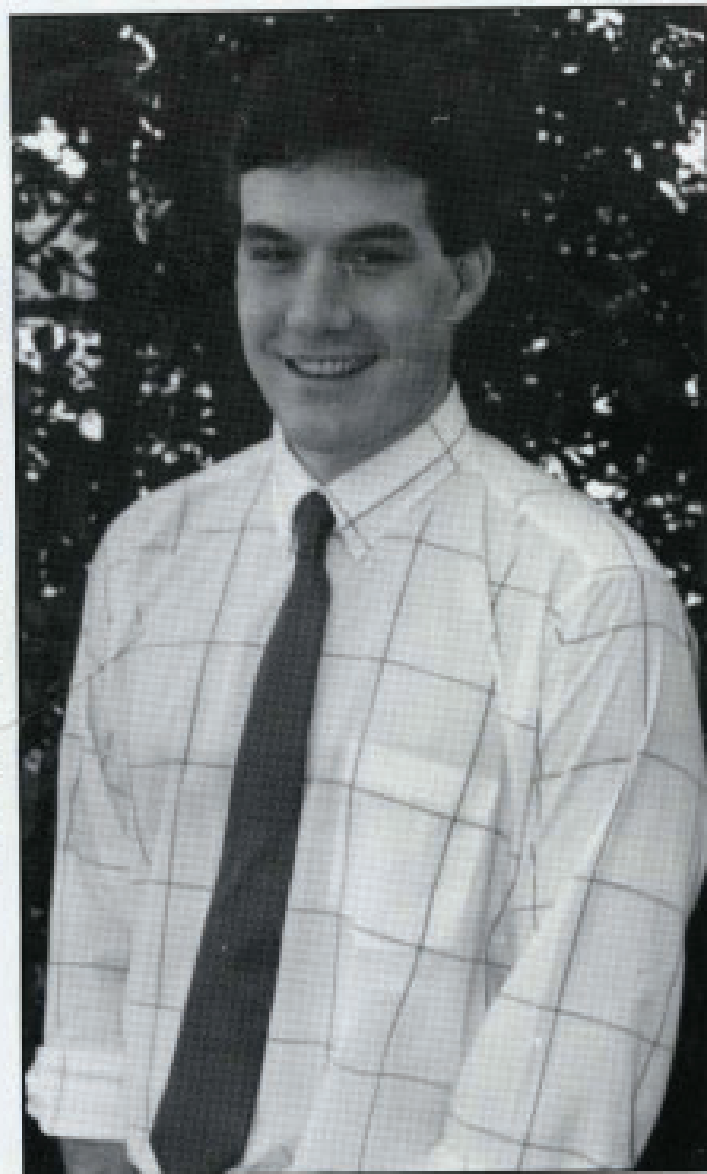

chapters. Almost \$676,000 has been donated since the project was adopted in 1963. Many scholarships are given through the Foundation—\$64,000 or more annually.

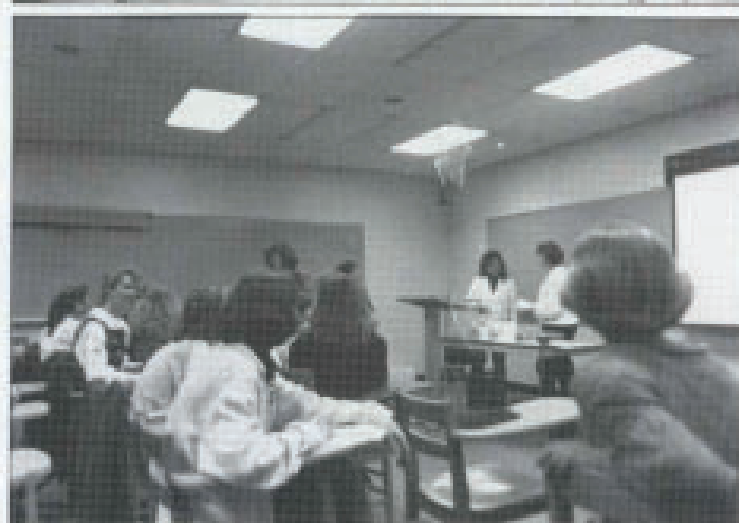
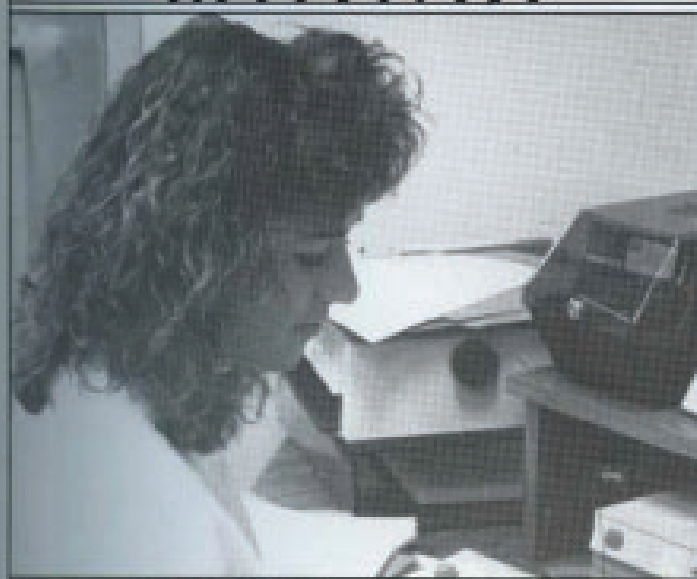

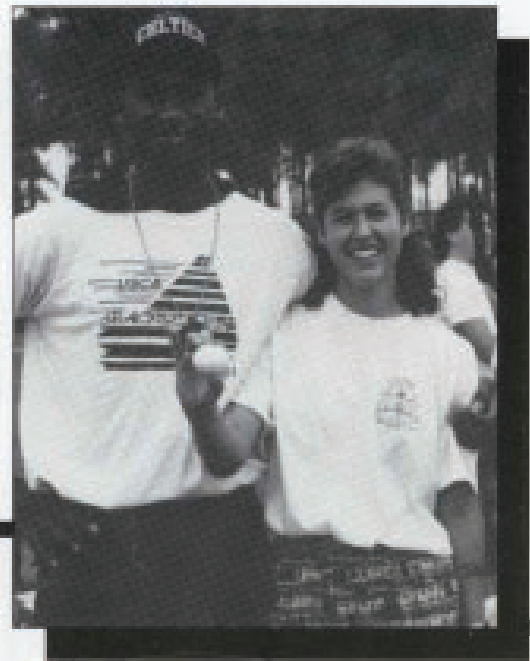
represent the result of the mission and embodiment of the spirit in the world. Because they are the emerging essence of the institution, they will strive to enhance the special relationship between students, alumni and others.

The cast for "Puss and Boots" is

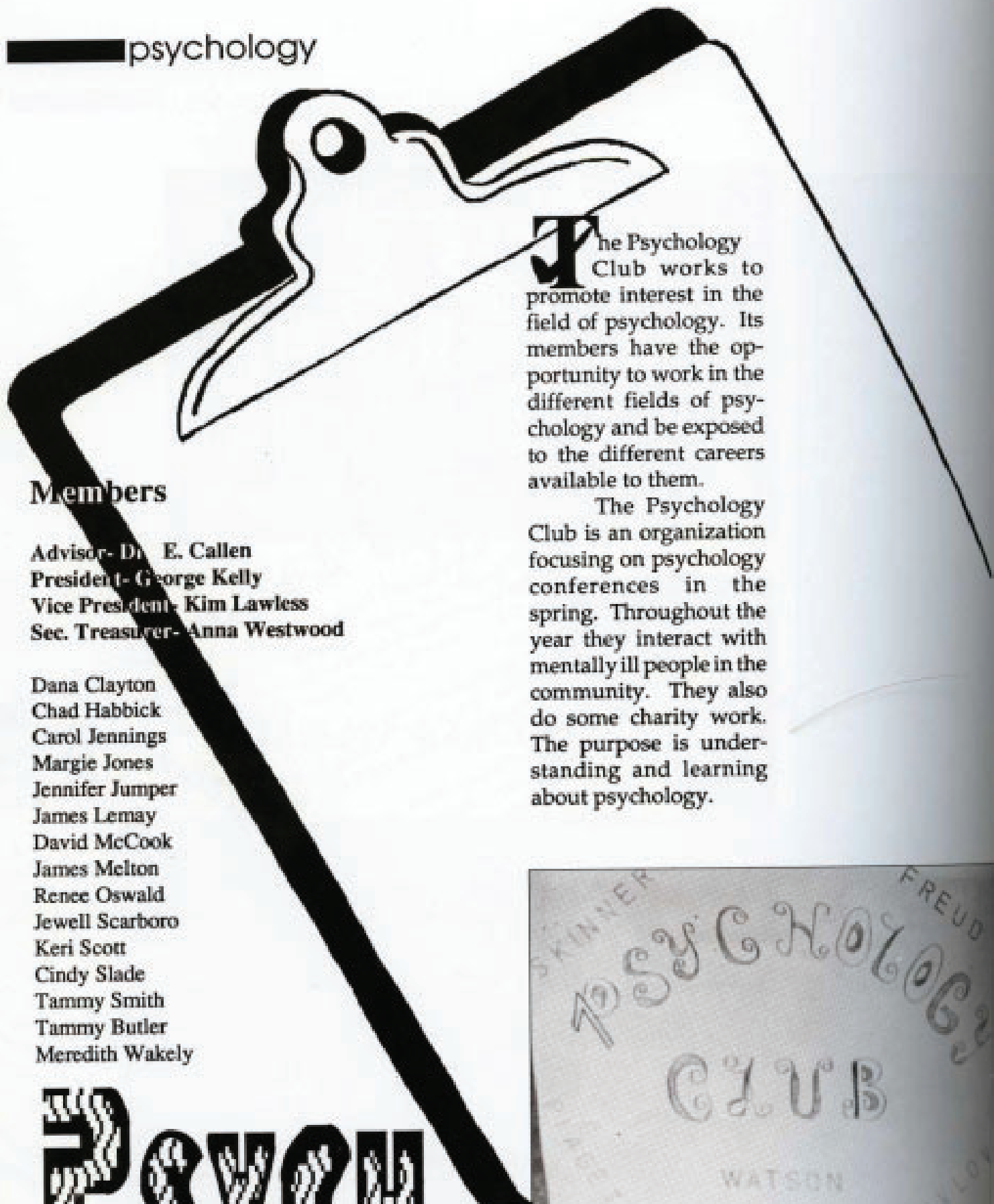

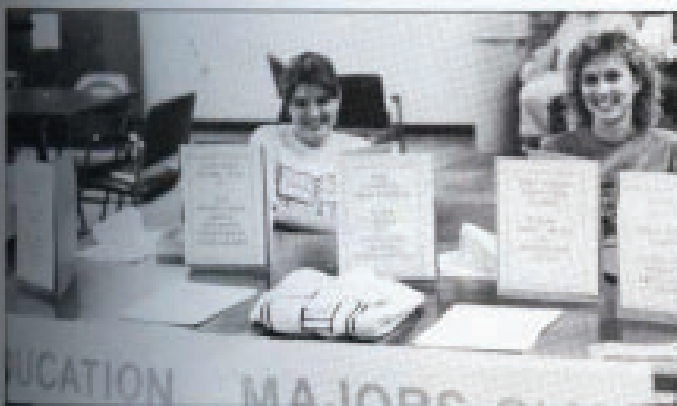
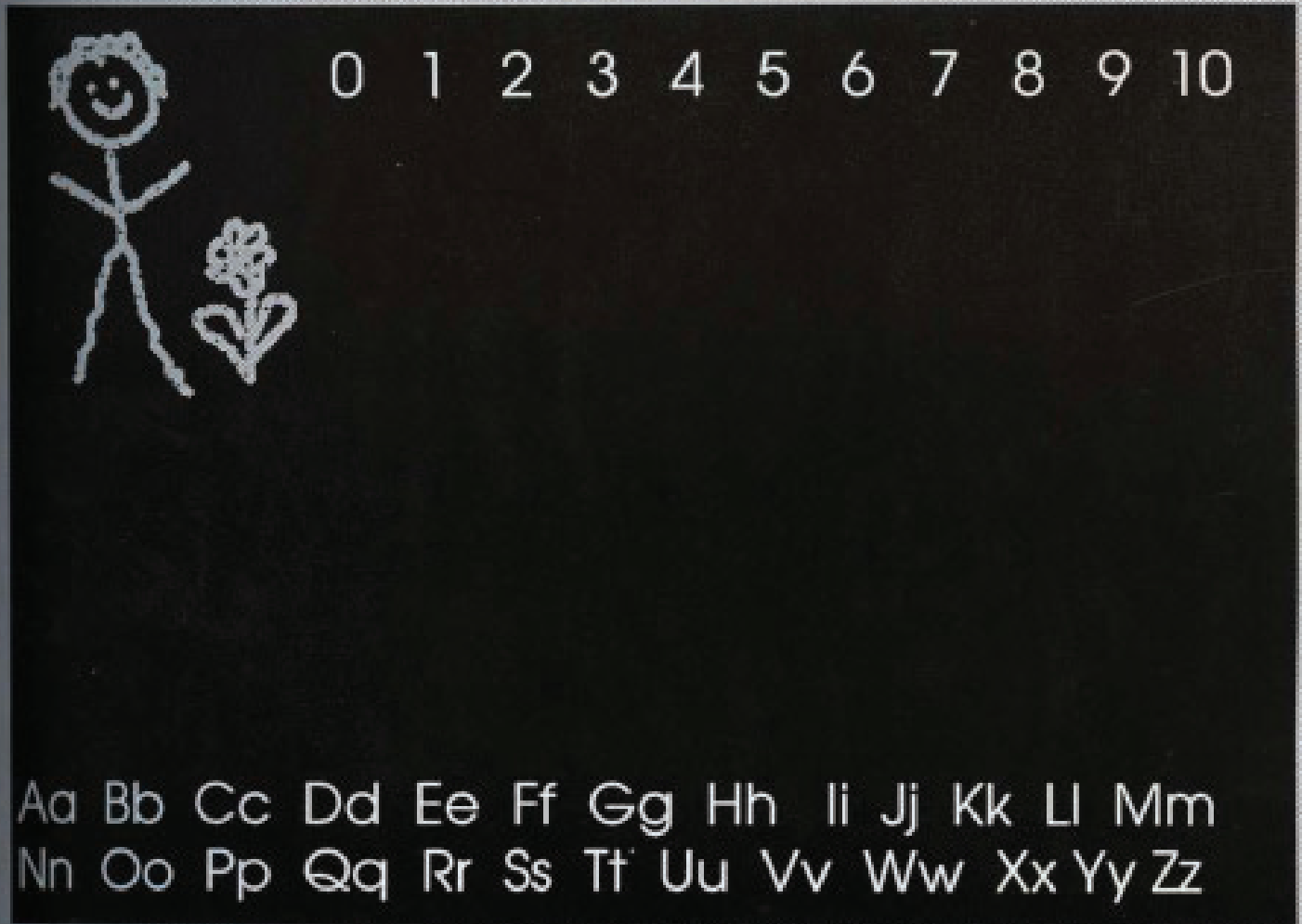
The ebony ribbon across the center of the shield dignifies friendship binding together the members.

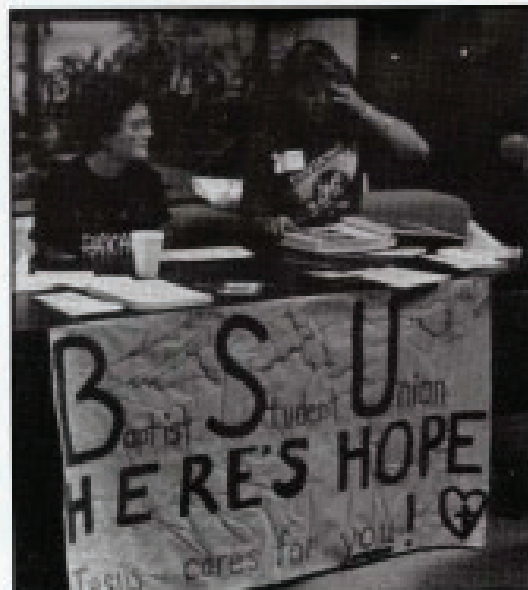




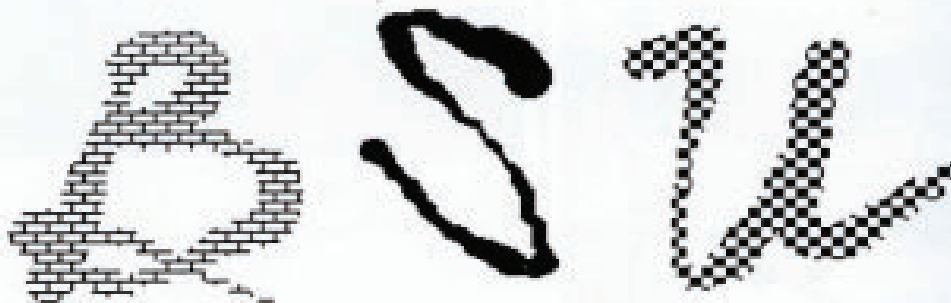
## baptist student union

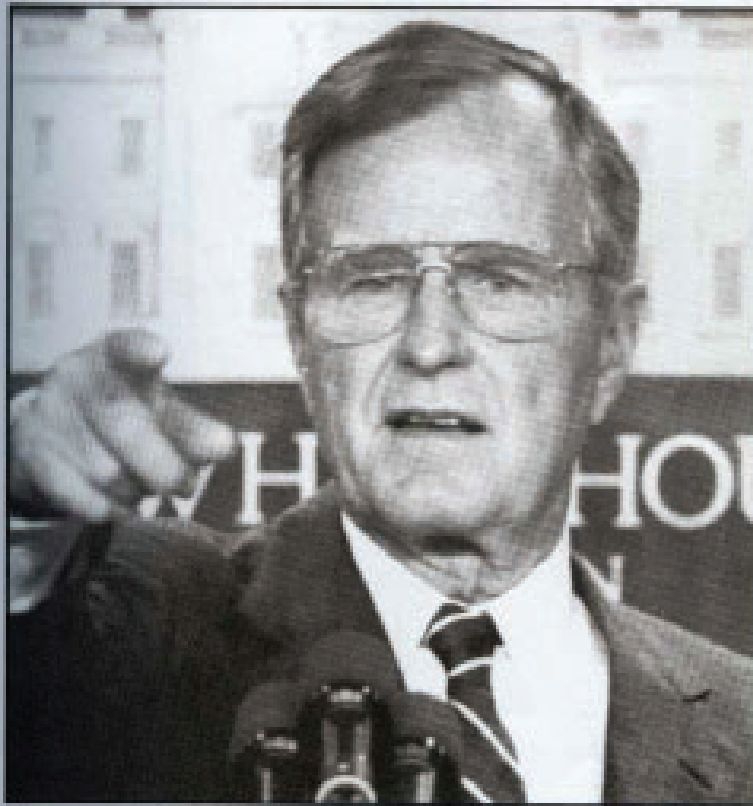


One year after Manuel Noriega was extradited to the U.S. from Panama on drug charges, he was still being held by the U.S. Marshal's Service in Miami.

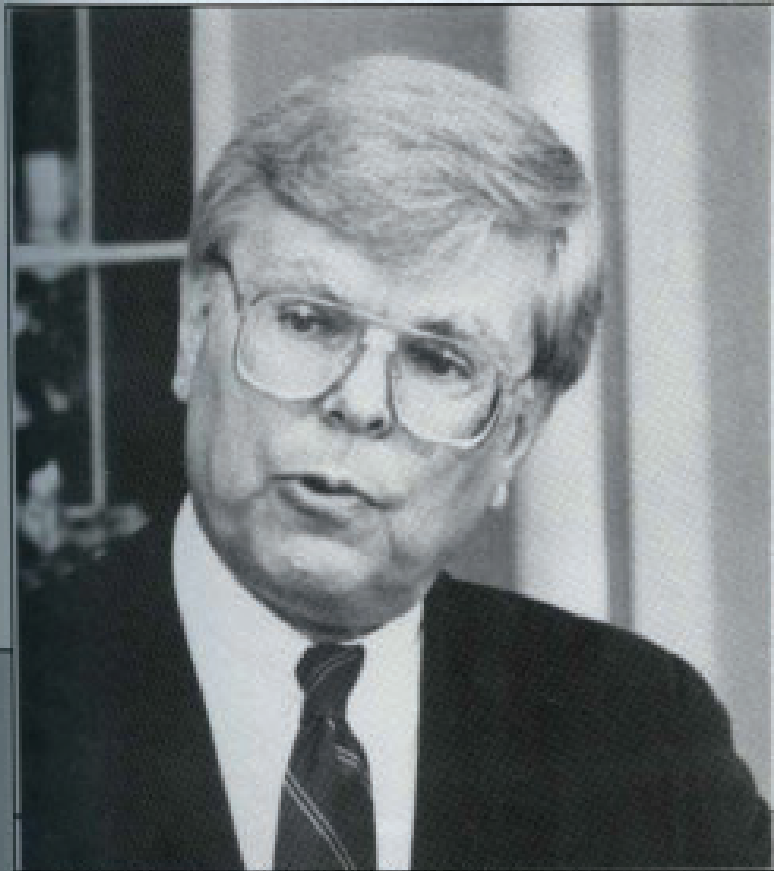

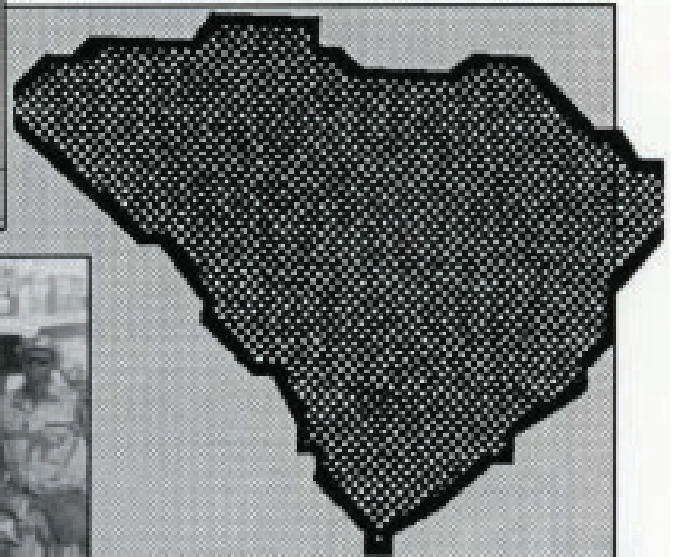
The University of South Carolina lost its president in 1990. James B. Holderman resigned in July. His resignation was a result of controversy over his use of funds.

# Iraq takes prisoners of war

Iraq claimed Sunday to hold seven allied aviators as prisoners of war, including three U.S. airmen who were "inter-ved on Iraqi television. The strained voices of those who were Marine Corps Chief Warrant Officer Hummer, 46, Navy Lt. Jeffrey and Marine Lt. Col. Clifford broadcast Sunday by CNN. 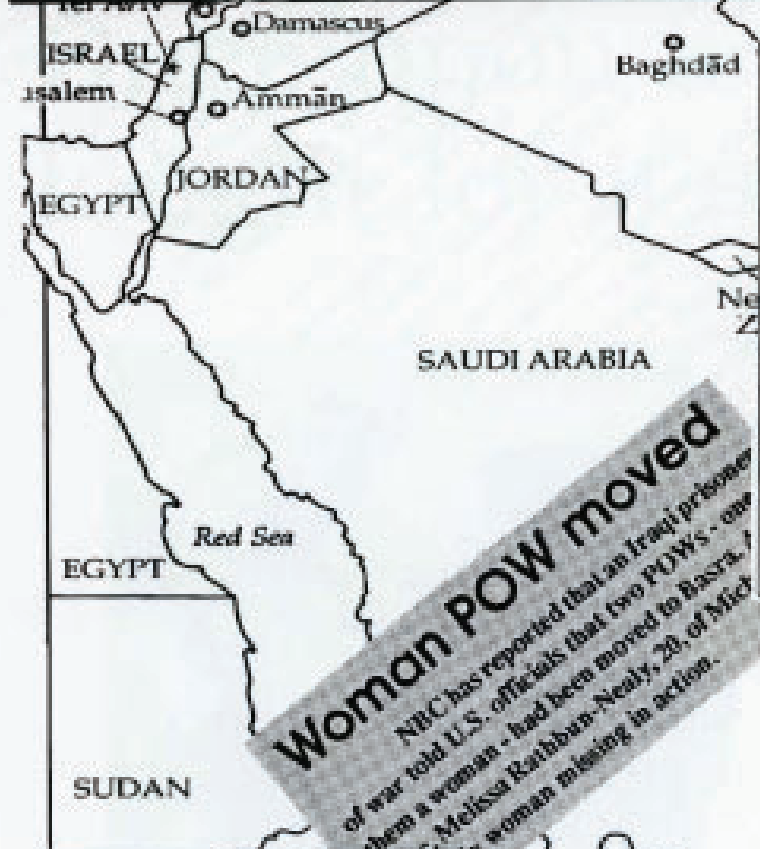

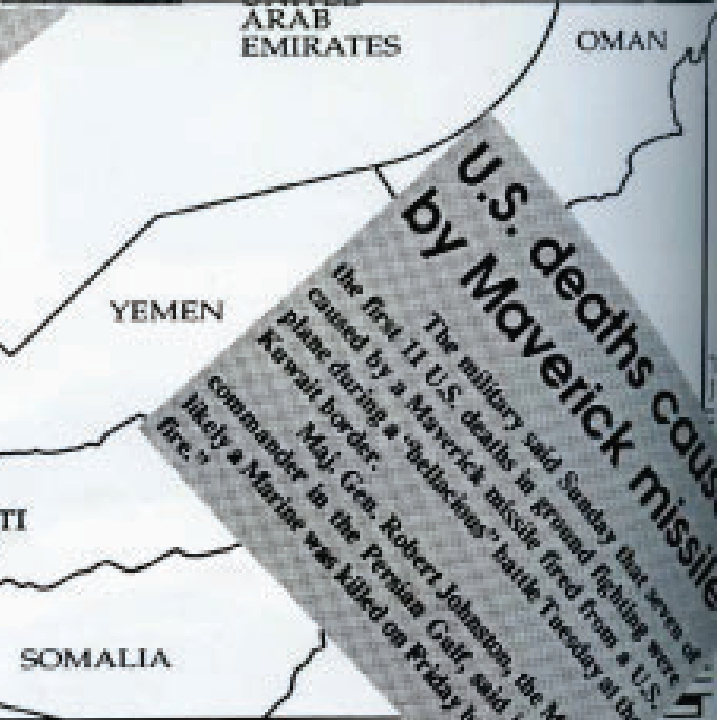
Key U.S. allies are heading to Washington this week to discuss the progress of the Gulf war - and the timing of the expected ground offensive.

**Woman POW moved**

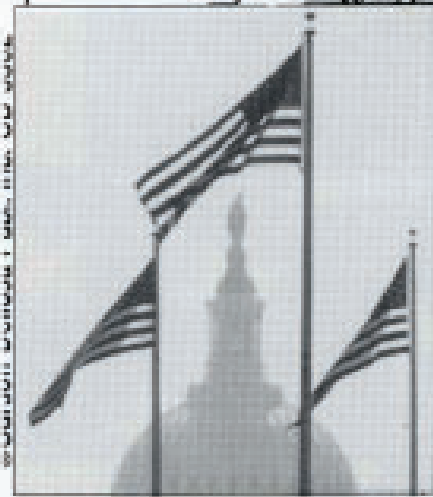

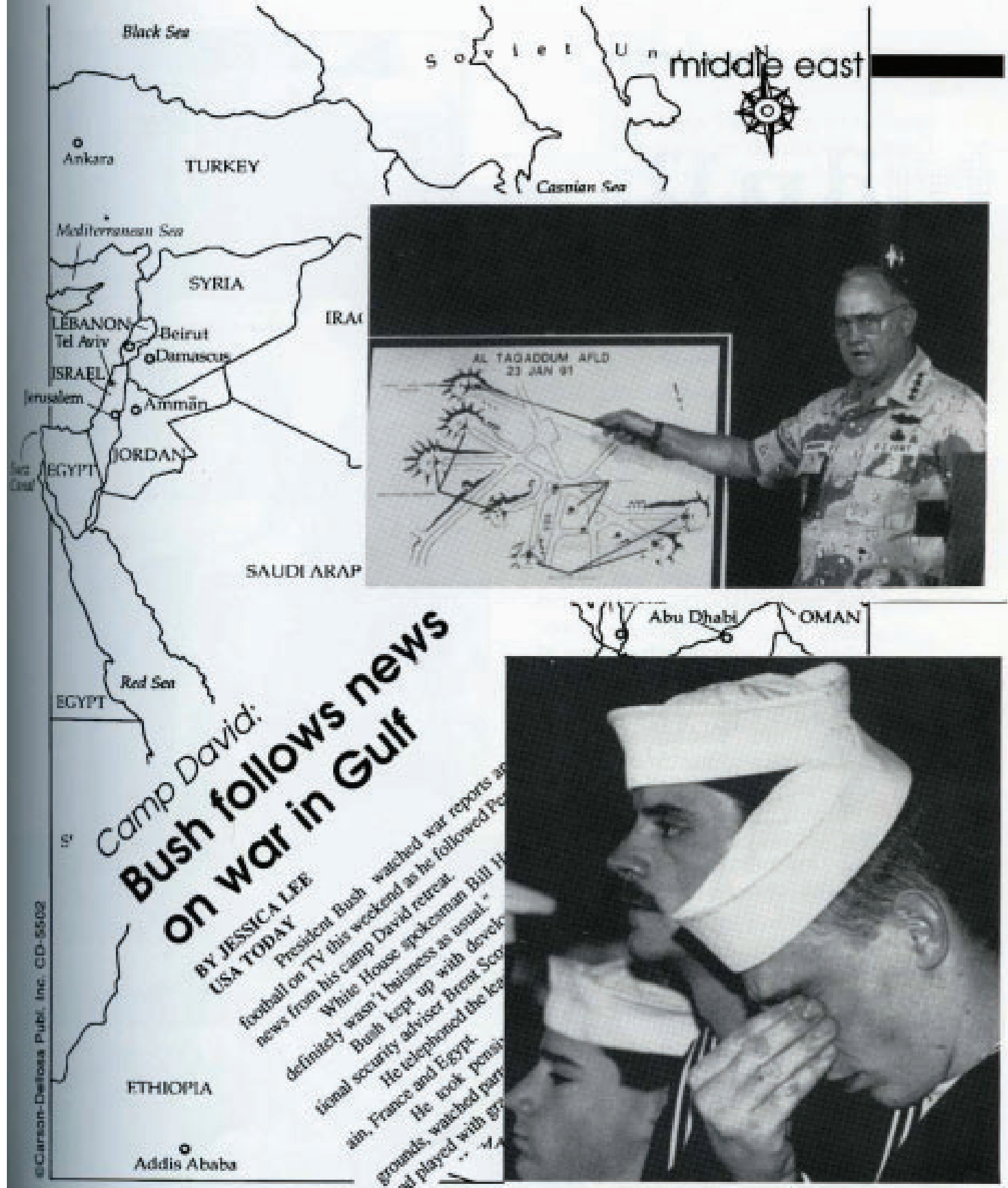


**U.S. deaths caused by Maverick missile**

changes have taken place since the beginning of USCA in 1961 when it resided in the lovely renovated mansion "Banksia." At this time our school was a two-year off-campus center of the University of South Carolina. One hundred thirty-nine students along with a secretary and three full-time faculty members, one of which served as the director composed the student body and administration. The official title of the school at that time was the University of South Carolina Aiken Center. The students however affectionately called it "Harvard on the Hill". Only freshmen and sophomore courses were offered in the beginning, but in 1968 USCA gained accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools as a Branch of the University of South Carolina and as a junior college. The first associate degrees were awarded in June of 1968.

---

USCA's move to its present site came about in 1972 where all activity was executed under one roof of a multi-purpose building known as the Administration Building. Since that time six additional





buildings have been added with two more on the drawing board. One of the latest additions to the campus is the beautiful and historic Pickens-Salley House formerly owned by the Secessionist governor of South Carolina, Francis W. Pickens, and Mr. and Mrs. Julian B. Salley of Aiken.

In 1975 the Aiken Branch was able to provide senior-level courses and began creating several baccalaureate degree programs. In 1976 the Board of Trustees granted academic autonomy to the Aiken campus. The first Baccalaureate degrees were granted in May, 1977, and in December, 1977 USCA became fully accredited as a senior college.



## Thirty years later as we celebrate our 30th Anniversary in 1991

it is difficult to believe that we have an enrollment of students that reaches over 2900, 108 faculty members. The school now awards baccalaureate degrees in 18 major areas of study and associate degrees in two areas. Through the office of Graduate Regional Studies over 1500 students have pursued postgraduate degrees or a graduate degree are not the only concern of the administration at USCA, but also the community in general. A variety of continuing education courses and an ever growing series of cultural activities are also offered.

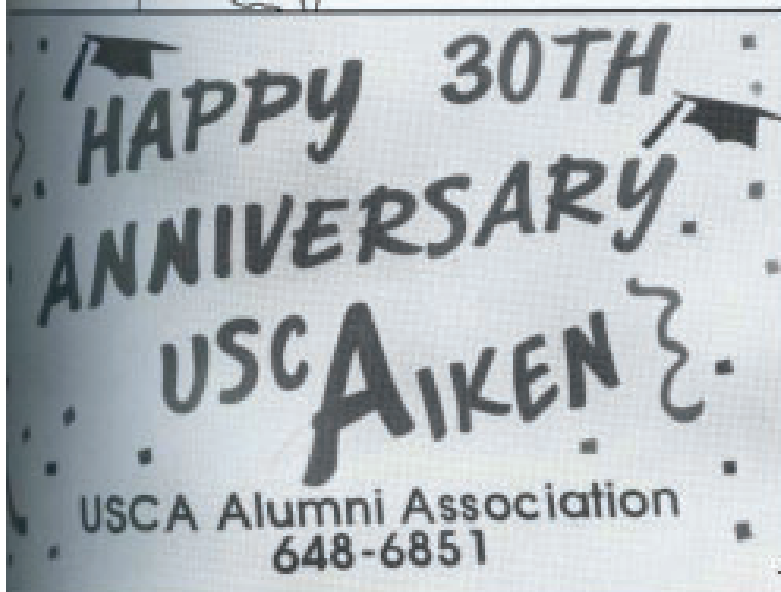
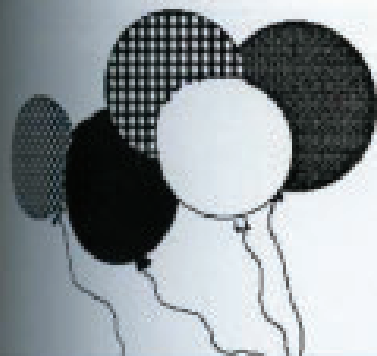


From its very inception, USCA has fostered a strong partnership with the community it serves. The symbol of the Aiken Partnership is "The Double Knot", a free-form bronze sculpture that serves as the centerpiece of the USCA Administration Building courtyard. It represents the interlocking ties between the University and its community as well as the seamless bond between the two. The artist, Charles O. Perry, presented the work to USCA in memory of his father, Owen H. Perry, and stepmother, Florence E. Perry.



he move from Banksia to our present location is not the only change that has taken place at USCA. The student newspaper has changed its name three times from "The Rebelaire" to "The Hoof" to the present name of "Pacer Times" and the student yearbook has changed its name from the "Pacer" to "Unbridled". The logo that is presently used has also been changed from the one used at the school's beginning. From 1961 to 1969, the nickname "Rebels" was used and had as their logo a short, fat, bearded old man in a gray uniform carrying a Confederate flag. During the seventies, it was felt that the logo was inappropriate and did not accurately represent the Aiken area. A committee composed of students, faculty, staff and administration was formed and was given the task of coming up with a new logo and nickname. Many names were submitted such as Thoroughbreds, Standardbreds, Trotters, etc., but the final decision came





down to "Pacers" which we are called today. The original logo that was drawn showed a man riding in a sulky drawn by a pacer. The picture was realistically representative of the nickname, but it was found that the drawing was not accurate because it was of a trotter and not a pacer. In 1975 a new design for our nickname was made and the result is the stylized pacer that we presently use.

---

In this 30th Anniversary year it is pleasant to reflect upon the history and hard work by many that has gone on before to make our institution the one we hold so dear. Dr. Robert Alexander, Chancellor of USCA says,

"...the growth and changes at USCA have not diminished our commitment to our mission; providing a quality education to undergraduates. Excellent teaching from our services are integral parts of the educational process at USCA. Our strength shall always be strongly entrenched in the personal interest we take in both the academic and social progress of our students."
